Rodríguez (2020) analyzes Martin Scorsese's films to understand how specific editing techniques contribute to their impact. Pearlman (2017) explores the broader cognitive and emotional effects of film editing beyond continuity. Mobbs et al. (2006) study the neurobiological mechanisms underlying the Kuleshov Effect and its influence on emotional
